

China exempts bifacial solar panels from tariffs

Are bifacial solar panels subject to tariffs?

The actions announced Thursday will end the exclusion of so-called bifacial solar panels, which are commonly used in utility-scale solar projects, from being subject to tariffs under Section 201 of the 1974 Trade Act.

What are the tariffs on solar panels?

The tariffs started at 30 percent and were set to decline by 5 percentage points each year over the course of four years. The first 2.5 gigawatts worth of solar cell and module imports were exempt from the tariffs.

How will tariffs affect solar panels in 2025?

Tariffs on solar wafers, polysilicon, and certain tungsten products from China are going to rise dramatically come January 1st, 2025, the Biden administration announced Wednesday. That means higher price tags on key materials needed to make solar panels at a time when solar is the fastest growing source of electricity in the US.

Are bifacial solar modules exempt from Section 201 tariffs?

Bifacial solar modules are exempt from Section 201 tariffs, as confirmed by the U.S. Court of International Trade (CIT) following a petition from solar advocacy group SEIA and co-plaintiffs NextEra Energy, Invenenergy Renewables, and EDF Renewables.

Who is exempt from solar tariffs?

The first 2.5 gigawatts worth of solar cell and module imports were exempt from the tariffs. The tariffs would have expired this month, but several manufacturers, including Auxin Solar, Suniva, Hanwha, LG and Mission Solar Energy, petitioned to extend the levies, indicating they were still needed.

Are bifacial solar panels subject to a tariff?

Bifacial solar panels were granted a full exemption from the tariffs in June 2019. Imports received a 25% tariff in 2019, a 20% tariff in 2020, and were scheduled for a 15% tariff in 2021. Various exemptions to the tariffs were allowed, mainly for small-wattage off-grid panels.

The Biden administration is expected to reverse a two-year-old trade exemption that has allowed imports of bifacial solar panel technology from China and other countries to avoid tariffs, Reuters ...

On February 4, 2022, President Biden announced an extension and modification of the existing safeguard tariffs for an additional four years. In his announcement, the President included an exemption for bifacial solar panels. This decision comes after the ITC recommended in November 2021 to extend the safeguard tariffs for an additional four years.

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The White House, after increasing tariffs targeting China across sectors like steel and aluminum, semiconductors, electric vehicles, batteries, critical minerals, solar cells, and ship-to-shore cranes, announced it will ...

Today's decision means that imported bifacial modules are once again exempt from Section 201 tariffs, effective immediately. The Section 201 tariffs are back to 15% for this fourth year, and any imports from the past year under the adjusted 18% tariff are eligible for refunds with interest.

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According to The New York Times, President Biden is imposing a tariff of between 14 percent and 15 percent for the next four years on imported crystalline silicon solar products, but his administration at the same time doubled the amount of solar cells that can come into the country without facing tariffs to 5 gigawatts and exempted bifacial ...

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
